The CRNA Regulatory Spectrum

Compliance

Focus: Statutes & rules

Mindset: Compliance with standards of practice and expected behaviours

Degrees of Discretion: Non-discretionary

Regulatory Response:

- Restrict scope of practice (conditions)
- Sanction (conditions)
- Remove permit
- \cdot Reactive

Right-touch Regulation

Focus: Outcomes & principles

Mindset: Minimize the use of regulation and establish problem clarity before developing a solution

······ Increasing Discretion

Degrees of Discretion: Proportional to risk of harm

Regulatory Response:

- Considerations of circumstances and impacts
- Outcome focused
- Responsive and agile

Right-touch Relational Regulation

Focus: Social norms & relationships

Mindset: Maximize regulatory outcomes through connection and collaboration with the broader regulatory environment

Degrees of Discretion:

Discretionary

Regulatory Response:

- Compliance to social norms is voluntary
- Increased compassion
- Share knowledge
- Proactive/preventative

HEALTH PROFES

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HPA Framework

The Health Professions Act (HPA), directs the College to:

- Provide direction to the regulated profession; and
- establish, maintain and enforce standards for registration and of continuing competence and standards of practice of the regulated profession.

College Requirements

The CRNA is assigned four mandated responsibilities:

The Health Professions Act does not instruct the College **HOW** to fulfill these requirements.



Standards of Practice at the CRNA





The Health Professions Act requires the CRNA to:

establish,
maintain,
and enforce,

a code of ethics and standards of practice.





All registrants of the CRNA are held accountable to the established standards of practice and the Code of Ethics.



Standards may be developed because:

It is required by legislation
Mandated by government
When broader direction is required to serve the public interest to prevent or reduce the risk of harm to the public

The standards prioritize public interest, patient safety and quality of care while embracing diversity, inclusivity, equity, accessibility and cultural safety, guiding registrants to align their practice with ethical standards.

COLLABORATIVE & TRANSPARENT

The standards are based on current research, best practices, and societal norms, with transparent development and input from external partners.





PROVIDING GUIDANCE

The standards use clear and unambiguous language to guide registrants in delivering safe, competent and ethical care across diverse settings and practice areas.



AGILE & ADAPTABLE

The standards reflect current healthcare practices, are adaptable to changes, and are relevant to today's needs while being responsive to future advancements.





CONVENIENT INFORMATION

The standards are readily accessible to the public and registrants via numerous channels and through all levels of the CRNA's service delivery.





CLEAR EXPECTATIONS

The standards clearly indicate the expectations for registrants in the provision of nursing services.
